What is Technical Assistance?



TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE (TA) PROVIDERS SUPPORT COMMUNITY-BASED ORGANIZATIONS IN APPLYING FOR BSK FUNDS.



Examples of Technical Assistance

Determine if your organization/program = good fit for RFP

Guide you through the logistics of the application process

Help you “tell your story”

Help you find data to support your narrative

Help you fully answer application questions

*TA is NOT grant writing

Who can get TA?



- FREE to anyone responding to a Best Starts RFP
- Special emphasis on small community-based organizations and organizations that have not accessed public funding before



How can I get Technical Assistance (TA)?

- Once an RFP opens, you can [read the bios of the TA providers](#); choose one who seems like they'd be a good fit for your organization
- Reach out early in the process!
- Contact the provider via phone or email
- Give provider 24 hours to respond before reaching out to another provider
- Contact the TA provider at least three days before RFP closes
- If the fit does not seem right, feel free to let the provider know and reach out to a new one!




WHAT'S THE STORY?





THINGS TO KNOW

- Technical assistance consultants can help you find data to incorporate in your application (from King County and lots of other places).
- An evaluation plan is not required as part of your proposal. BSK will partner with funded organizations to develop one.
- You should express willingness to participate in data reporting and incorporate resources for the time this will take your staff and any equipment you might need in your budget. Technical assistance can also help figure that out!
